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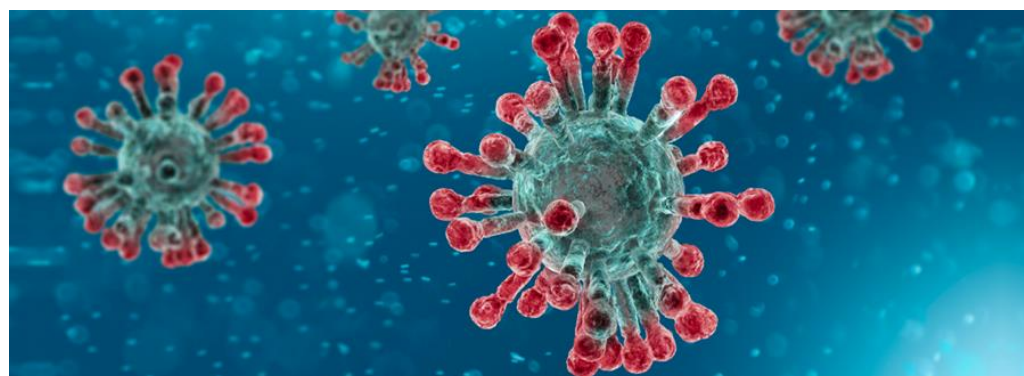
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IN RESPONSE TO COVID-19

COMMUNITIES AND CIVIL SOCIETY ACTION AND SOLIDARITY

The world is hit hard by the Coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic, an infectious disease caused by severe acute respiratory syndrome coronavirus 2 (SARS-CoV-2). People living with and affected by HIV, TB and malaria, and key and vulnerable populations have been severely affected by the current measures taken by national governments across our region to address and curb the spread of the infection. At the same time, the outbreak of the pandemic has highlighted and exacerbated various issues, including stigma and discrimination, violence, legal and policy barriers, proof of identity issues, livelihoods, access and quality of healthcare and related services for people living with and affected by the three diseases have all been impacted and will increasingly see populations and groups being left behind. Nationwide lockdowns and curfews are posing severe challenges to communities accessing life-saving medicines and health services. With the health workforce burdened by COVID-19 responses, our communities will face further challenges in receiving information and accessing healthcare.

Despite the challenges, our communities have once again come together in solidarity and respond to COVID-19 amidst these times. Local organisations led by and serving our communities have commenced with emergency responses towards COVID-19 to ensure that our communities have uninterrupted access to life-saving drugs and daily essentials, including food.

To highlight the continued efforts and resilience of our communities, GFAN AP has developed a [webpage](#) on our website to collate COVID-19 responses by our communities and civil society partners across the Asia-Pacific region and to share Global Fund and partner released guidance/resources on COVID-19. Please visit our website for further information and updates.

India

[India HIV/AIDS Alliance](#) has been supporting key populations that they serve through its emergency funds to access essential requirements such as food during the lock down in India. #BreakTheChain – a social media campaign has been launched to raise awareness on COVID-19 amongst key populations.

The [National Network of People Living with HIV \(NNPLH\)](#) has put in place an emergency response under the VIHAAN programme to deliver ARVs to those living with HIV and are currently coordinating with the [National AIDS Control Programme](#) to ensure access to HIV health services continues to be available throughout India.

Nepal

The [CCM](#) has developed an emergency plan in consultation with [Save the Children](#) (PR) for all three disease components and the Nepali Government in response. Save the Children Nepal has also issued an “Interim Guidance for Managing PLHIV and Harm Reduction Programmes for People living with the Diseases during COVID-19 Response”.

[Blue Diamond Society \(BDS\)](#) one of the SRs in the HIV component, continues to reach out to the constituencies the organisation serves through online messaging and other virtual platforms.

Philippines

[Action for Health Initiatives \(ACHIEVE\)](#) is currently monitoring the situation faced by the communities they work with in the Philippines. In order to respond to the needs of the community, ACHIEVE has realigned funds from several projects with the approval from the donors to provide financial assistance to 31 families so far.

Indonesia

[Spiritia Foundation](#) (An NGO PR) has issued a policy for its SRs and SSRs to continue its daily operations virtually.

It continues its engagements with over 80 SRs and SSRs including 2,000 outreach workers and peer supporters in 200 districts virtually.

The [Positive Indonesia Network \(PIN\)](#) with other key population networks have launched a Rapid Response Survey to identify the situations faced by PLHIV due to COVID-19 as well as assessing their needs regarding access to health services.

Sri Lanka

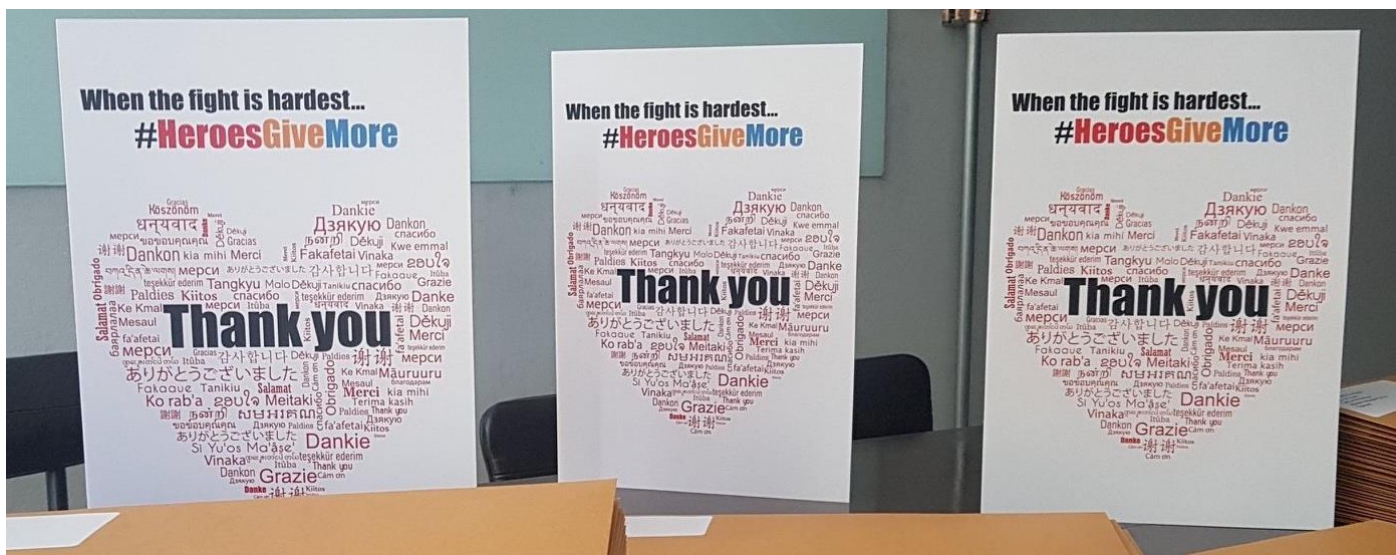
[Lanka Plus](#), one of the three PLHIV-led organisations in the country, is working with the National STD/AIDS Control Programme to deliver ARVs to PLHIV and ensuring they have access to HIV services.

CARE Consortium, with the support of [APCASO](#) and GFAN AP is currently gathering information from communities and SRs on the impact of COVID-19 on the national HIV responses and expects to use the information for the country dialogue process.

Pakistan

The [Association of People Living with HIV in Pakistan \(APLHIV\)](#) has established an “Emergency Response Centre (ERC)” which reaches out to PLHIV and facilitates the supply of ARVs accordingly. APLHIV is working with the National AIDS Programme to use courier services to deliver ARVs to PLHIV.





THANKING GLOBAL FUND SIXTH REPLENISHMENT HEROES

GFAN AP and country partners rolled out a “Thank You” campaign after the Sixth Replenishment Pledging Conference expressing deep appreciation from communities and civil society in Asia-Pacific to the donors, as well as to communities and civil society advocates around the world who worked tirelessly for a successful replenishment that raised an unprecedented US\$14 billion, the largest by any multilateral health institution.

This was launched in the second week of December 2019, during the week of Universal Health Coverage Day on 12th December. Over 120 #HeroesGiveMore Thank You cards and letters were sent to Heads of States and Ministers of Health of public donors, Heads of Private Sector and Foundations, and communities and civil society advocates.

MYANMAR



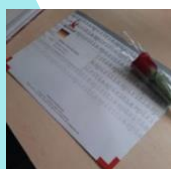
Alliance Myanmar together with Myanmar Youth Star rolled out the GFAN AP “Thank You” campaign. A booth was organised to collect signatures of communities and civil society representatives for the cards. 14 cards were sent to embassies of donor countries present in Myanmar on the 13th January 2020.

BANGLADESH



BRAC rolled out the “Thank You” Campaign in December 2019 by sending Thank You cards to 29 embassies of donor countries in Bangladesh.

INDONESIA



Spirita Foundation rolled out the “Thank You” campaign in December 2019. “Thank You” letters were sent to 16 embassies in Jakarta, Indonesia.

As a follow up of all pledges made at the Sixth Replenishment Conference, the Global Fund is now working to turn these pledges into contributions. Contribution agreements are being developed, and a number of them have already been signed. As of Q1, contributions for 2020 have started coming from some donors. GFAN AP acknowledges and thanks Japan for securing US\$ 476 million, as the largest annual contribution to the Global Fund, which signals Japan's strong leadership and commitment in global health, at a time when the world is fighting COVID-19.

INDIA



The India Working Group for Health Advocacy (IWG) and India HIV/AIDS Alliance joined hands in rolling out the “Thank You” campaign in India in December 2019. 35 embassies of donor countries in India received the cards, and a Thank You card was also sent to the India office of the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation.

VIETNAM



Centre for Community Development Initiatives (SCDI) rolled out the “Thank You” campaign in January 2020 alongside the Vietnamese Traditional New Year - Tet Nguyen Dan or Tet. Thank You cards along with campaign materials were sent to embassies of donor countries present in Hanoi, Vietnam.

PRINCE MAHIDOL AWARD CONFERENCE

28TH JANUARY – 2ND FEBRUARY 2020, BANGKOK, THAILAND

[Side Event] From Political Commitments to Reality – Ensuring Accountability for UHC Progress and Equity

28th February 2020

The theme for PMAC 2020 was “Accelerating Progress Towards UHC” – a priority area of work of GFAN AP and partners in the region as well as globally. GFAN AP joined the side event, which was co-organised by APCASO, the Global Fund Community, Rights and Gender Department, and Expertise France and French 5% Initiative.

Speakers from communities, civil society, technical partners and governments highlighted the importance of implementing the commitments set forth within the Political Declaration on UHC adopted at the United Nations High-Level Meeting on UHC in New York, USA in September 2019. Best practices of the involvement and important role that communities and civil society played were shared by various speakers – including from Cambodia, Indonesia and Thailand.

Distinguished speakers, presenters, panellists and commentators included Lady Roslyn Morauta, Global Fund Board Vice-Chair; Dr Taraneh Shojaei, Embassy of France in Thailand; Dr Khuat Thi Hai Oanh, SCDI/UHC 2030/CSEM/APCASO/GFAN AP; Dr Agnes Soucat, WHO; Excellency Tia Phalla, Kingdom of Cambodia; RD Marte, APCASO; Kate Thomson, Global Fund; Eric Fleutelot, French 5% and Expertise France; Rico Gustav, GNP+, Eamonn Murphy, UNAIDS; Kamma Blair, UNFPA; Akihito Watabe, UHC 2030/WHO; Meirinda Sebayang, Positive Indonesia Network; and Osamu Kunii, Global Fund.

The key note speech was delivered by Lady Roslyn Morauta, Vice-Chair of the Board of the Global Fund, who emphasised the important role that the Global Fund following the successful Sixth Replenishment had in supporting countries in strengthening resilient health systems, and the importance of communities and civil society in health systems through community responses.



[Side Event] Shaking up 2020 AP Movers' Meeting I: Towards the “UHC That We Want” in Countries

29th February 2020

GFAN AP together with APCASO and the Global Network of People Living with HIV (GNP+) gathered community and civil society partners in the region attending PMAC 2020 to initiate a dialogue and discussion on the outcomes of the Political Declaration on UHC and the next steps in making UHC a reality. The discussion entailed what needed to move at the country level and the role of communities and civil society in monitoring UHC implementation in countries. Representatives discussed the opportunities, barriers and challenges, and different modalities of national health insurance schemes in the region with the objective of identifying key country activities that could result in accelerating the momentum on UHC and leaving no one behind in the Asia-Pacific.

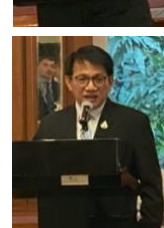
[Embassy Event] Celebrating the Donors of the Global Fund

30th January 2020, Bangkok, Thailand

The Embassy of the French Republic to the Kingdom of Thailand under the leadership of H.E. Ambassador Jacques Lapouge hosted an event in the margins of PMAC 2020 to thank all donors who pledged at the Sixth Replenishment of the Global Fund as well as to reiterate the commitment of France in global health as part of its global health strategy 2017 – 2021, following its major role in hosting the Global Fund Replenishment Conference held in Lyon in October 2019.

The event hosted by the French Embassy with the involvement of GFAN AP was held in the evening of the 30th January at the Residence of the French Ambassador and brought together communities and civil society representatives from national and regional organisations, as well as representatives from donor embassies and the Thai government.

Distinguished speakers included H.E. Jacques Lapouge; Lady Roslyn Morauta, Global Fund Board Vice-Chair; Dr Preecha Prempre, Deputy Director-General of Department of Health Thailand; Dr Khuat Thi Hai Oanh, Chair of GFAN AP Steering Committee and Dr Agnès Soucat, Director of the Department of World Systems Governance and Financing, WHO. All speakers emphasised the importance of supporting countries on Domestic Resource Mobilisation, achieving UHC; the role that communities and civil society have in accountability of countries in achieving UHC; and the support and role that the Global Fund had towards achieving the SDGs, specifically SDG 3 while leaving no one behind after the successful outcomes of the Sixth Replenishment.



[Event] Celebrating Global Fund Sixth Replenishment Heroes

5th February 2020, Jakarta, Indonesia

With the support of GFAN AP, Spiritia Foundation and the Ministry of Health co-organised an event to celebrate the successes of the Sixth Replenishment through the support of donors, and communities and civil society. Representatives from embassies of the Commonwealth of Australia, Republic of India, Federal Republic of Germany, French Republic and USAID attended the event along with communities and civil society, and Indonesian government representatives.

The event provided a platform for Indonesian communities and civil society and other stakeholders, including Parliament Members and representatives from the Ministry of Health to initiate a dialogue on UHC and Domestic Resource Mobilisation for health and the three diseases, amidst the funding request that Indonesia was putting together for the new allocation cycle.

Mme Myriam Saint-Pierre, Première Conseillère of the Embassy of the French Republic in Indonesia commended the efforts by the Government of Indonesia in increasing its health budget and strengthening its national health insurance systems, and reiterated the commitment of the French Republic in the global health agenda.

Lady Roslyn Morauta delivered a keynote address on the critical role played by communities and civil society in implementing and donor countries during the Replenishment process with special acknowledgement given to Dr Tahir of Tahir Foundation for his unwavering support towards the Global Fund and the three diseases, as a partner to the Global Fund since 2013, which has seen Tahir Foundation contributing \$44.5 million to date – by far the largest contribution to the Global Fund by a private foundation in an emerging economy.

A panel discussion was moderated by Mr Halik Sidik, Executive Operation Secretary of the Indonesia Association of Local Health Offices, with panellists Honourable Anggia Ermarini, Parliament Ginting S.; Sp.P (K), FCCP, Brigadir Jenderal TNI (Pum.), Special Staff of the Minister of Health in the field of Development and Health Financing; and Ms Meirinda Sebayang, CCM Member and Head of Jaringan Indonesia Positif. They discussed the urgent need to step up political will, community engagement, and domestic resources needed to achieve the national targets for the three diseases in Indonesia.



NATIONAL STAKEHOLDERS MEETING ON UHC & HEALTH FINANCING

4TH FEBRUARY 2020, JAKARTA, INDONESIA

Spiritia Foundation and GFAN AP co-organised the National Stakeholders Meeting on Universal Health Coverage & Health Financing, which brought together a diverse group of stakeholders from government representatives, technical partners, Tahir Foundation, and communities and civil society representatives to discuss the UHC implementation Strategy in accordance with country commitments after the endorsement of the Political Declaration on UHC at the High-Level Meeting on UHC in September 2019, in the context of sustainable and available health financing towards the three diseases.

Lady Roslyn Morata in her keynote address, appreciated the Government of Indonesia's commitment as it increased its national budget for health, and at the same time highlighted the need for this to translate into prioritisation of key populations in accessing quality services, commodities and care; and ensuring further increased domestic financing for the responses at the country level to achieve its national targets.

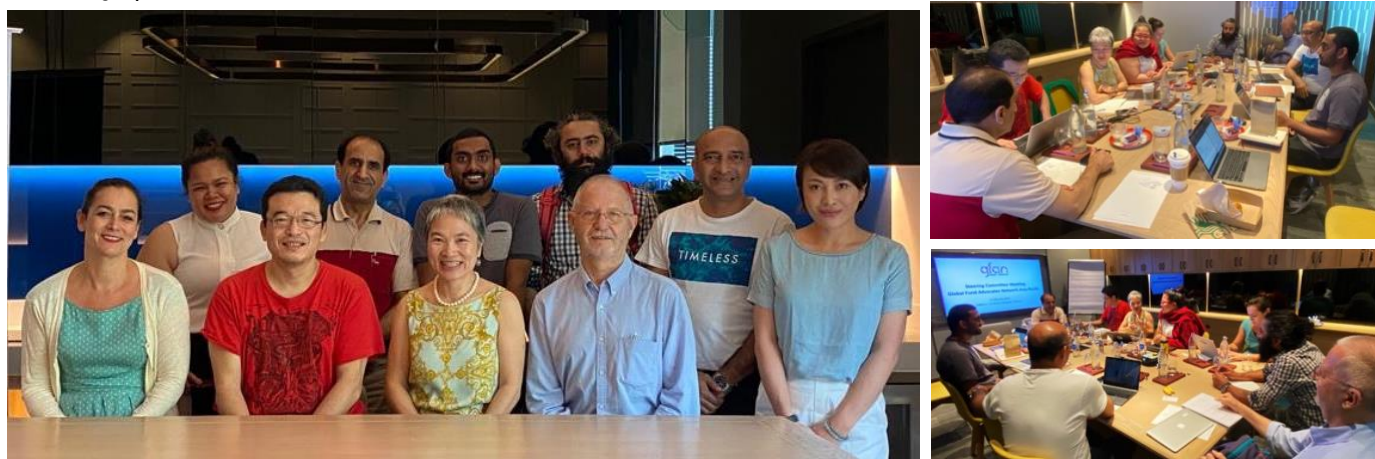
A panel discussion on "The Indonesia Challenges and Opportunities for AIDS, TB & Malaria" was moderated by Zubaedah Djohar, Humanitarian Activist, previously attached to the Women's Human Rights National Commission of Indonesia, with panellists Dr Wiendra Waworuntu, M.Kes, Director of Control and Prevention of Direct Communicable Diseases; Dr Siti Nadia Tarmizi, M.Epid. Director of Prevention and Control of Vector-borne Diseases and Zoonosis (P2TVX); and Ms Yenti Nurhidayat, FITRA National Secretariat. It was acknowledged by one of the panellists that this was a rare occasion to have both directors in a meeting together, and panellists discussed with questions from the floor the responses of Indonesia within its mandate of the national strategy on the three diseases, and the sustainability of financing of Indonesia in health and for key and vulnerable populations, as well as key challenges and gaps that need to be addressed for UHC implementation in Indonesia.



GFAN AP STEERING COMMITTEE & PARTNERS MEETING

1ST FEBRUARY 2020, BANGKOK THAILAND

GFAN AP Steering Committee Members and Country Partners gathered at the margins of PMAC 2020 to strategize on GFAN AP 2020 – 2021 activities, engagements, and priorities. Following the successful outcomes of the Sixth Replenishment, with the support of country partners in the region through collective efforts of the #LoveMoreGiveMore and #HeroesGiveMore Campaigns, Steering Committee Members and country partners shared ideas and recommendations for even more robust engagements on advocacy – including on Domestic Resource Mobilisation, Universal Health Coverage and accountability mechanisms, sustainable financing, and transitioning impacts.



COMMUNITIES & CIVIL SOCIETY MEETING WITH LADY ROSLYN MORAUTA

4TH FEBRUARY 2020, JAKARTA, INDONESIA

Spiritia Foundation and GFAN AP organised a meeting between communities and civil society working on the three diseases and Lady Roslyn Morauta, Vice-Chair of the Global Fund Board following the National Stakeholders Meeting on UHC & Health Financing.

The meeting provided an opportunity for Lady Roslyn to provide an overview of the key priorities as a member of the leadership of the Global Fund Board, the important issues that are being discussed and on the horizon of the Board, as well as for Lady Roslyn to interact with local communities and civil society to better understand the challenges and barriers facing communities and civil society at the national level.

Lady Roslyn shared plans on the development on the Global Fund Strategy Review and Development and emphasised the important role that communities and civil society have within the Global Fund – especially at the country level as both implementing partners and in advocacy for better health responses and systems.

Participants highlighted the need to further strengthen community engagement, addressing legal and policy barriers and gender equality to achieve the broader goals of the Global Fund. This meeting encouraged the exchange of ideas and recommendations on the funding request development and sustainable financing in Indonesia, ensuring the involvement of key and vulnerable populations to reach the targets of the National Strategic Plans of Indonesia.





GLOBAL FUND ADVOCATES NETWORK MEETING

2ND – 5TH MARCH 2020, AMSTERDAM, NETHERLANDS

The Global Fund Advocates Network (GFAN) Meeting was organised to reflect on the outcomes and lessons learnt of the Sixth Replenishment, as well as to strategize and for partners to share and identify actions for key priorities — including the Global Fund Review and Strategy Development process, Domestic Resource Mobilisation (DRM), COVID-19 responses.

On the 2nd March, the New Venture Fund (NVF) for Global Fund Advocacy Grantees Meeting was held, to reflect on the evaluation outcomes conducted on the Sixth Replenishment on NVF grantees, as well as to share and discuss on Phase III of the NVF. GFAN AP under NVF Phase II prioritises Domestic Resource Mobilisation and UHC work — with subgrants to country partners in India, Cambodia, Indonesia and Vietnam.

On the 3rd March, GFAN and its regional partners — GFAN Africa and GFAN AP met to share updates on work, as well as discuss plans on DRM, communications strategies, and key priorities for 2020 — 2021, and roles for the GFAN meeting taking place over the next days.

GFAN Africa and GFAN AP facilitated a session on DRM on 4th March. Linda Mafu, External Relations of the Global Fund presented an update on [Global Fund DRM priorities, and timelines](#). A panel discussion with RD Marte, APCASO; Olivia Ngou Zangue, CS4ME; and Rico Gustav, GNP+ reflected on DRM advocacy within the UHC landscape, and the importance of ensuring sustainable financing within countries that are transitioning. Specific impacts are significant to countries in the Asia-Pacific, which will see more countries transitioning in the next decade. Specific concerns were raised on the investments made by countries and the expenditures on health and the three diseases based on evidence collated by aidspan, and the work that is needed to step up DRM. GFAN AP and GFAN Africa also shared key priorities and activities planned on DRM work.



GFAN AP organised a meeting of participants from Asia-Pacific attending the GFAN meeting, as an opportunity to network and share key priorities and activities, and to identify areas of collaboration on the 4th March 2020. Partners working in the region — from Thailand, Vietnam, Japan, Australia, and India shared country and/or organisation specific updates and priorities. From discussions, GFAN AP will be developing a DRM Tracker that aims to track investments by countries in the Asia-Pacific region, given that within the Investment Case, reaching the US\$14 billion target would spur \$46 billion worth of domestic funding. The tracking of these investments — specifically how this would go towards the three diseases, and to communities and civil society is prioritised.

Abhina Aheer, member of the India Working Group for Health Advocacy (IWG) also shared experiences of the Government of India the hosting the Preparatory Meeting in February 2019, and the work that has ensued on advocacy for an increase of the India health budget and towards the three diseases, and its priorities and collaborations with GFAN AP and partners.



WORLD TUBERCULOSIS DAY

24TH MARCH 2020

Activists' Coalition on TB Asia Pacific (ACT! AP), APCASO, Global Coalition of TB Activists (GCTA) and GFAN AP jointly released a statement in observing World TB Day on the 24th March 2020 entitled "[End TB By 2030 with Solidified Political Will, Increased Investments and Improved Community Meaningful Engagement](#)".

The statement called for:

- All Member States to commit to transform the commitments of the [Political Declaration of the UN HLM on TB](#) to concretise actions through ensuring political commitment and increasing domestic resources for national TB responses, including resources for community-led organisations and civil society, in line with achieving UHC and leaving no one behind;
- All donors to increase their investments for the TB responses, financial and otherwise, to close the funding gap of nearly US\$ 5 billion annually and to invest in building and strengthening communities and civil society systems for a robust TB and health response;
- All countries, including Global Fund funded implementing countries to employ the most effective, rights-based interventions to increase the momentum of response, ensure highest return on investments, and to sustain the gains made so far;
- All government and national TB programmes to guarantee effective and meaningful engagement of communities living with and affected by TB and TB survivors in designing, implementing and monitoring TB interventions to ensure community-led and owned interventions.
- All community networks to initiate and include areas of convergence with other health and social issues, such as migration, maternal and child health, and non-communicable diseases to achieve a multi-sectoral, comprehensive and inclusive TB response.

While countries are urgently responding to the COVID-19 pandemic, we are seeing key and vulnerable populations, and communities affected by TB increasingly deprioritised within health systems, and/or have their TB-related treatments and services made inaccessible with stricter controls and restrictions on movement.

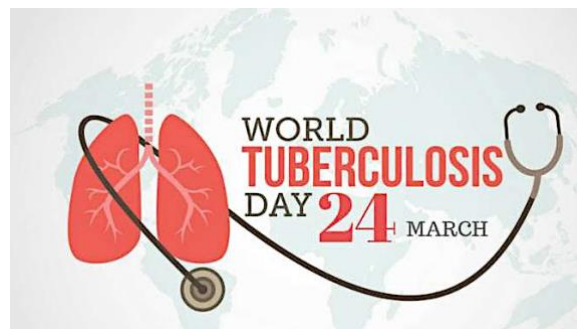
GCTA has been working with WHO SEARO and Stop TB Partnership on ensuring continuity of TB services during the COVID-19 pandemic. Please visit the [GCTA Facebook page](#) for more updates.

GFAN AP began engaging with C20 processes in 2019, when Japan hosted the G20. With six countries from the region as members of the G20, GFAN AP sees critical opportunities in engaging in this political platform within the Health Working Group of C20.

The Health Working Group for the G20 hosted by Saudi Arabia met virtually on the 24th March 2020 to share its three key themes and priorities with representatives of the G20 Health Working Group.

Rachel Ong, Regional Coordinator of GFAN AP set the scene for the two-hour virtual meeting and presented on overarching priorities of the Health Working Group including the emphasis of leaving no one behind through rights and gender equality-based interventions, equity in accessing healthcare, the impacts of COVID-19 and SDGs, and the need for value-based healthcare to bring into consideration costs that can be brought further down through TRIPs.

Discussants from this region also included Heejeong Han, member of the Korean Activists for Global Health (KAGH) presenting on lessons learned during the COVID-19 pandemic in South Korea.



END TB BY 2030 WITH SOLIDIFIED POLITICAL WILL, INCREASED INVESTMENTS AND IMPROVED COMMUNITY MEANINGFUL ENGAGEMENT

World Tuberculosis (TB) Day in 2020 is observed today on 24th March, while the world is hit hard by the Coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic, an infectious disease caused by severe acute respiratory syndrome coronavirus 2 (SARS-CoV-2). COVID-19 and TB share similarities as both diseases impact the respiratory system, mainly the lungs. The Activists' Coalition on TB Asia Pacific (ACT! AP), APCASO, Global Coalition of TB Activists (GCTA), and the Global Fund Advocates Network Asia-Pacific (GFAN AP) while acknowledging the severity of COVID-19 and its impact(s) on global health, health systems and economies, reminds the importance of recognizing that TB still remains a major cause of ill health. TB is one of the top 10 causes of death worldwide and the leading cause of death from a single infectious agent ranking above HIV and AIDS. In 2018, globally, an estimated 10.0 million people fell ill with TB; 1.2 million HIV-negative people and an additional 251,000 people living with HIV died of TB.

The Asia-Pacific region continues to bear the brunt of TB infections with 44% of infections in WHO South-East Asia region and 18% of infections in WHO Western-Pacific region. India (27%), China (9%), Indonesia (8%), Philippines (6%), and Pakistan (6%) are among the eight countries accounting for two-thirds of the global total of TB infections in 2018.¹ India contributes to one-fourth of the global burden of multidrug-resistant tuberculosis (MDR-TB) with inadequate diagnostic infrastructure for drug susceptibility testing (DST).²

The Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) had set the bold target of ending TB by 2030 and the Political Declaration of the United Nations High Level Meeting (UN HLM) on TB in 2018 has identified a number of forward looking targets including treating 40 million people for TB disease and reaching at least 30 million people with TB preventive treatment for a latent TB infection in the five-year period 2018-2022 and mobilize at least US\$ 13 billion annually for universal access to TB diagnosis, treatment and care by 2022 which will lead the world to ending TB by 2030.

ACT! AP, APCASO, GCTA and GFAN AP express grave concern that the current trajectory of the TB response is not leading towards ending the disease as an epidemic by 2030 as among other challenges, funding gaps of close to US\$ 5 billion annually impede progress in the overall TB response.

Those affected and living with TB still face severe challenges in accessing lifesaving medicine due to stigma, discrimination, and affordability of existing drugs especially for those from low-income backgrounds and affected by MDR-TB³ despite the target of achieving zero percentage of TB-affected households incurring catastrophic costs related to TB care by the year 2020 in the End Tuberculosis (TB) Strategy.

Effective and meaningful engagement of communities living with, affected by TB and survivors of TB in national and local level TB responses still remain far less as the responses are mainly biomedical. The responses to the current COVID-19 pandemic is indicative of the lack of capacity of existing health systems to effectively respond to a global health crisis in a timely manner, and is also applicable to the existing health systems to address the TB epidemic⁴ and emphasizes the urgency to establish people-centred, sustainable and resilient systems for health (including communities and civil society systems) to address existing epidemics and pandemics that may hit the world in the future.

With less than a decade to 2030, ACT! AP, APCASO, GCTA and GFAN AP calls upon all stakeholders of the TB response at local, national, regional and global level to commit to ending TB as an epidemic by 2030 through solidified political will, increased investments and improved meaningful community engagement.

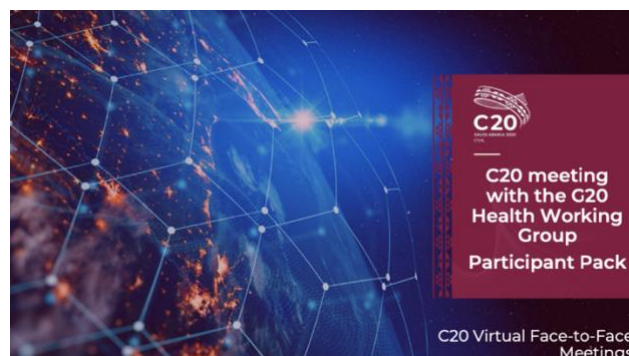
