1. **START NOW!!**

2. **Strength in numbers** – hold regular planning meetings and intel sharing with your community and as a KP coalition
- There is a lot to do – share the roles and responsibilities across your group: Who does what, by when?
3. Review the current grant and budget ([Data Explorer](#) or [CCM Dashboard](#))
4. Contact your Key Population and civil society CCM representatives
5. Reach out to your CCMs, PRs, SRs, Local Fund Agency (LFA), and Fund Portfolio Manager (FPM)
- Get the names, positions and email addresses of CCMs, PRs, etc.
  - Understand who holds the decision-making power at the PR-level and at the CCM-level
  - Demand your own meeting as a group (and follow-up by email for a paper trail)
  - Demand the formal meeting & consultation schedule for the reprioritisation and revision process
  - Demand all documentation being used in the revision & reprioritisation **in advance of each meeting/consultation**

## What “Lifesaving” means to us: A Feminist perspective from women and girls in all of our diversity<sup>1</sup>

In the midst of the Global Fund’s reprioritisation process and ongoing adaptation measures introduced due to funding constraints, Women4GlobalFund (W4GF) acknowledges the financial pressures faced. Nevertheless, we strongly assert that lifesaving cannot be reduced to pills, diagnostics, clinical outcomes, or cold indicators.

The current global retreat from funding gender justice, human rights, community responses and HIV, TB, malaria - is not neutral, it is a violent political decision with real consequences for women and girls in all their diversity. We are watching:




- UNAIDS scale back its presence<sup>2</sup>, weakening the only UN global agency placing gender equality at the center of the HIV response.
- The Global Fund is introducing a set of adaptation measures to Grant Cycle 7 (GC7) and the remaining Grant Cycle 6 (GC6) grants in implementation. These measures aim to ensure continuity of “essential” programming in the context of resource constraints, yet in doing so, some investments linked to human rights and gender-transformative components are being deprioritized or deferred, raising serious concerns about the sustainability of equity-focused progress.
- Donors merely shift toward “efficiencies” erase women’s realities and undermine accountability, only ensuring treatment continuity, a surge in anti-rights organizing, often funded, while feminist organizations fight for survival.

### 4.3 What evidence should communities bring to the CCM?

The decisions for which programmes to pause or deprioritise will be challenging, and there will be many competing priorities advocating for funding. To effectively advocate for community priorities, you will need to provide evidence of the importance and effectiveness of community programming.

1. Review the current grant. The first step is to understand which activities are currently funded in the active grants. You may have access to this information through your CCM, or you can find detailed data about grant budgets on the Global Fund’s Data Explorer or on this CCM Dashboard.
2. Categorise activities using the Global Fund language. The Global Fund has specifically highlighted the types of activities that should not be cut. If you can advocate for why community-focused programmes fit those criteria, you will be more likely to be successful. Use evidence from your organisation, networks, and community, as well as from community-led monitoring (CLM) programmes.

Global Fund’s language	Examples of how you can describe community programmes
Programmes should be “life-saving”	Explain why “community-led” is life-saving. The programmes delivered for and by communities are life-saving. Community-led organisations are responsible for delivering life-saving services to the people most affected by HTM. Without them, drugs and commodities will sit unused in warehouses and clinics. If we stop funding community programmes, we will lose these trusted implementers, and our most vulnerable populations will lose the care they need to stay alive.
	Describe why some programmes cannot be immediately integrated. Dublin healthcare facilities are a key part of service.

## GLOBAL FUND REPROGRAMMING RESOURCES

The Global Fund Secretariat and Board have acknowledged the probability of a major funding shortfall in the 2023–2025 grant cycle (GC7) and issued new guidance on “reprogramming” (reprioritizing and revising) GC7 grants. This guidance aims to preserve lifesaving HIV, TB and malaria services amid constrained budgets. As implementers, advocates, and communities begin to interpret and act on this guidance, there is a growing need for shared tools, information, and collective learning.

We aim to use this page as a hub to collect and curate advocacy resources, analysis, and tools being developed across our network—from civil society partners, implementing organizations, and GFAN members. Our goal is to keep this space dynamic and regularly updated, making it easier for everyone to find what they need and build on each other’s work.
